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Looking Back at the Second Year

Miyake Okiko, Chief Director

I would like to thank you for the fact that we could finish the second year of the new organization. Although it is still difficult to make a long term financial forecast, we have been energetically working on various projects and have submitted our income and expenditure report. (Please refer to our Webpage.)

One of our new activities in 2011 was the preparation for the movement to "General Incorporated Foundation" from next April in line with the new system of a nonprofit foundation.

Every odd-numbered year we present the International Brothers Grimm Award. The 13th recipient is Professor Jiang Feng from China. He edited the encyclopedia of Chinese children's literature and published many works, such as an outline and history of Chinese children's literature. He also spent half a year at our institute as a visiting fellow in 1993. After returning to his country, he established a research institute of children's culture like our

institute in Zhejiang Normal University where he taught for many years. He trained many researchers and

authors there. We expect a researcher who is taught by Prof. Jiang Feng will win the Grimm Award in the near future. We hope this unique award under the joint auspices of the Kinranj-kai Foundation and Osaka Prefectural Otemae Senior High School Alumni will continue for a long time. On October 13th 2011 Prof. Masafumi Nakagawa, who was our special advisor and had been actively involved in our institute for many years, passed away at the age of 90. His accomplishments were wide may; his children's literature and picture books; his research and criticism dealing with children's culture; his creative works and practical activities like puppet shows; his training a lot of researchers and authors; and his religious works and lectures to name but a few. For our foundation, he left behind a great legacy including the rich exchanges with various people which stemmed from his rich personal connections, and performances in Yume-no-Ike theater. We will continue to make them known to the public. Our first step is classifying the books he donated and making a list of the materials.

With regard to our own self-generated projects, we have realized our plan for producing a publication and started up the editorial committee. Next year will mark the end of the three year transitional period. With this unique project, supported by the power of our research capability and our "comprehensive professional knowledge" we would like to contribute to the advancement of children's literature and culture.

13th International Brothers Grimm Award to Be Presented to Professor Jiang Feng

The International Brothers Grimm Award is presented by the International Institute for Children's Literature, Osaka and the Kinran-kai Foundation and Osaka Prefectural Otemae Senior High School Alumni Kinran-kai every other year to an individual who has contributed significantly to the international progress of the research of children's literature.

The 13th award in 2011 was presented to Professor Emeritus Jiang Feng at Zhejiang Normal University in China and an award presentation ceremony and a commemorative lecture were held.

<Reason for the award>

Prof. Jiang Feng established a base for research

into children's literature in China and contributed to the development and improvement of that research . He also has widely worked as a central figure in the field of research of children's literature in Asia.

He has taught in Zhejiang Normal University since 1952, was a pioneer of children's literature, and has made every effort to train researchers of children's literature, as a result, researchers and editors were produced in large numbers.

Professor Jiang Feng has written many books based on his research of children's literature such as Introduction to Children's Literature (1982) Chinese Modern History of Children's Literature (1987), The Development History of Children's Literature (2007). In addition he edited Encyclopedia of Children's Literature in the World (1992).

He played an important role in the 10th Conference of Asian Children's Literature Association held at Zhejiang Normal University in October, 2010 and has disseminated information on Chinese children's literature via many international conventions, such as the Conference of Asian Children's Literature Association and the International Symposium between China and Japan in 1985.

<Outline of the Commemorative Lecture>

Prof. Feng summarized the history of and prospects for Chinese children's literature.

He equated the period of its origins with the singing of a lullaby, and placed the end of the 19th century as the period of "waking". A new stream of thought appeared via the May Forth Movement in 1919, which enabled authors of children's literature who saw children as human beings to come to the fore. In this period the new understanding of children gained by Lu Xun and Zhou Zuoren showed what could be achieved.

In 1978 with the implementation of the Chinese Economic Reform, the "present" period began. Yan Wenjing and Cao Wenxuan took a lively part in this, and from the 1980s to the 90s authors aimed to make works of great artistry rather than ones of enlightenment. He paid attention to traditional Chinese culture and



valued the works which seemed to be authentically Chinese, also looking at the coexistence of minority races and nature. He went on to explain how he expected to see fantasy stories with particularly Chinese characteristics to appear.

After the lecture, "Chinese Children's Literature, an interview with Prof. Jing Feng" was held with Prof. NARUYMI Tomoko and our Chief Director Miyake Okiko.
